STEEPLE ASHTON PARISH COUNCIL

Tree Planting

The village has requested a further batch of trees from the Woodland Trust for delivery this autumn. If you have available land which is near to a public footpath, or similar, please get in touch if you would like us to add some trees to it. We will also be replacing some of last year's saplings which unfortunately perished over the hot summer. New trees will also be added around St Marys recreation ground.

To mark the 70 years of the Queen's reign, we aim to plant some trees along the High Street between Ashton House and the Longs Arms. We have consulted on a suitable species and have chosen Sorbus Lutescens; this is a Mountain Ash/ Rowan which is a small, native, upright, slow growing variety with minimal maintenance requirements. It has lighter, silvery, more decorative leaves than most trees and so would enhance the existing view in the village without becoming too tall or dominant.

To make room for the trees, we are considering moving the Best Kept Village plaques (currently outside the Merchant's House) to an alternative location in the village. Please let us know your thoughts on this.

Neighbourhood Plan Update

In response to Wiltshire's Local Plan, the Council has decided to proceed with the preparation of a Neighbourhood Plan for Steeple Ashton. The plan will cover the entire parish area and it is anticipated that it will focus on the allocation of land for housing development as required by the Local Plan.

We are told that Steeple Ashton will have to provide 30 to 35 new dwellings over the next 15 years. Through the Neighbourhood Plan process, the village community can have a say on where these houses should be built. Without this plan the development will be located at the discretion of Wiltshire Council and landowners/developers.

Progress to date comprises:

• designation of the Steeple Ashton Neighbourhood Area & registration with Wilts Council;

- request submitted for a Rural Housing Needs survey;
- short-listing of consultants to assist with the project;
- preparation of consultant's brief and request for costs.

Once we have a consultant on-board, we will be able to apply for grant funding to cover these costs.

We aim to hold a public meeting in early November to present the aims of the plan, how it will be carried out and to request that interested members of the community join the steering group.

Preparation of a Neighbourhood Plan involves extensive community liaison and ultimately must be approved by a parish referendum. There will be plenty of opportunity for everyone to provide input and to comment on the plans as they develop over the next 12 to 18 months.

Parish Council Vacancies

Your Parish Council currently has only six members out of its normal compliment of nine. We would welcome the support of more community minded residents; especially, but not limited to, those who could represent the views of residents in Ashton Common, Common Hill, Holmeleaze, Newleaze and Elmsgate/Raydown.

New members can be co-opted to the council through a simple vote, there is no need to go through an election process. You do need to be over 18 years old and have lived or worked in the parish for the past 12 months.

Steeple Ashton Community Speed Watch What is the Community Speed Watch?

The Community Speed watch is a group of volunteers who record vehicle activity in our village, particularly in relation to exceeding the speed limit.

The Steeple Ashton Community speed watch reformed on 3rd August. We have four fully trained volunteers with potentially one more waiting for training. Our community speed watch is fully supported by Wiltshire Police who are responsible for providing the training and equipment including supply of our high visibility tabards.

What do we do with the information we gather?

Our activity must be approved by Wiltshire Police, and we report all our checks and information gathered to them, including providing details of motorist exceeding the speed limit. This enables Wiltshire Police to consider what further action they may consider appropriate.

Where are we completing the speed watch?

The 30mph speed limit runs throughout our Parish, from Ashton Common and Bleet through Steeple Ashton (see map for approximate details of the 30mph Zone).

Our current enforcement area for the speed watch is Common Hill however we are looking at additional locations within our Parish, this will require the authority's approval before checks can be take part in other locations.

How can you help?

We are very grateful for the warm response from the community who have provided a lot of useful information about the times and days we should focus our visits.

To be effective in the village and to provide resilience we do need more volunteers and are more than happy to talk to anyone interested in joining our small team.

The more volunteers that come forward the more occasions we can be out and about for our community.

### Jonathon Seed writes:

The past month has been dominated by the incredibly sad news of the passing away of Her Majesty the Queen. I was privileged to meet the Queen and other senior members of the Royal Family during my 23years of military service including during several years of ceremonial duty in London with the King's Troop Royal Horse Artillery. However the last occasion I met the Queen was as a Wiltshire Councillor in Salisbury in 2012 when she visited Wiltshire as part of her Diamond Jubilee Tour. The County Reception was a great success and again it was a privilege to be presented as the elected representative of the people of Melksham as Chairman of the Melksham Area Board. That visit to Wiltshire concentrated in Salisbury was a huge success and, I think, the last civic visit by the late Queen and the late Duke of Edinburgh to Wiltshire.

As one reign ends another immediately starts and we usher in the reign of King Charles III. There was much civic activity in Wiltshire to mark both the death of the Queen and the proclamation of our new King. This activity is coordinated by the Lord Lieutenant of Wiltshire, Mrs Sarah Rose Troughton. Several messages and instructions from the Lord Lieutenant were issued to Councils and Councillors from her office in County Hall in those key days last month. The moment was well prepared for with the relevant parts of Operation London Bridge (the detailed plan for the Queens death) having been previously circulated. Instructions were reissued to give local Wiltshire Councils and Councillors guidance on important matters like flag flying, national mourning and the Proclamation of our new King by Town and Parish Councils where they wished to participate.

The County proclamation of the new King took place in Trowbridge and was read to the assembled public and dignitaries by the High Sheriff, the Marchioness of Lansdowne. My wife and I chose to attend the local proclamation in Melksham and what a good choice it was. After signing the book of condolence in the Town Hall we gathered along with several hundred local residents outside Melksham Town Hall. The event was introduced by the Deputy Lord Lieutenant, Robert Floyd of Great Chalfield. King Charles III was proclaimed in Melksham by our young and very able Mayor Councillor Simon Crundell and followed by the singing of two verses of God Save the King. It was all brilliantly well done, very local and a superb local example of what we do best in this Country, County and our local Town.

Finally amongst all of these momentous events the business of local government continues. As your Wiltshire Councillor I am always available to help residents with any local government issues or problems that you may experience. What a contrast we see this week. Our beloved Queen passed away on Thursday 8th September and the nation has been watching as the Royal family, along with people around the world pay their respects to Queen Elizabeth who carried out her promise to serve her country and the Commonwealth for 70 years. By the time you read this, we will have watched as she was taken to Westminster Abbey for her state funeral. The Village Hall committee decided to open the hall from 10 am so that anyone in the village who wished to, could watch the funeral on the larger screen and perhaps share the momentous occasion with friends and neighbours over a cup of tea or coffee. 18 people came along to join us in watching what was an incredible funeral for this incredible lady.

On 11 June we were so sorry to say goodbye to our Moviola Film nights, with the final excellent film "The Duke" being shown. Thanks to Alison and Marcus for enabling us all to enjoy these films for so long.

We have also seen the welcome return of SAGE (Steeple Ashton Gardening Endeavours), a Musical concert, the Coffee Morning for Sudan, a family party and the Guides, Brownies and Rainbows are back after their summer using Acreshort Park.

The MOD also held several information meetings where they explained to villagers about the "Watchkeeper' drone which will be used in airspace over Keevil Airfield and local environs - it takes amazingly detailed photographs from here to as far away as the Clifton Bridge or Oxfordshire. It is all in aid of National Security and the MOD are keen to ensure local communities are fully informed and involved.

Looking forward, Trowbridge Players will soon be returning to entertain us, there will be a 'Mick Jogger' Rolling Stones village party in October and in December, the Village Hall committee will be holding a pre-Christmas Candlelit Supper where villagers can enjoy a two course homecooked meal, drink wine and share some social time with friends before the madness that is Christmas! Look out for posters in the village and on Facebook nearer the time. Tickets will be on sale in the village shop and we'll let vou know when.

Improvements: We are continuing to make improvements to the hall, with new stage extensions arriving soon to give more space for musical and theatre events. Also, a commercial dishwasher will be installed very shortly in the kitchen. We are very grateful for a contributions from Geoff Hvatt and the Parish Council towards the dishwasher and hope it will make a big difference when foodie events are held in the hall. At least the ladies won't be standing washing and drying for hours on end!

We are working towards a design for new Kitchen and Bar areas and have already taken delivery of two bottle coolers, which will be very useful for the 'Mick Jogger' party when the Bar proceeds will go towards the Village Hall Kitchen and Bar project. We are mindful that the Bar area has to be a flexible space and is often used as an overflow kitchen so our plans will ensure that this is still possible, but also that it can be used efficiently as a small bar and just as importantly look the part! Of course an upgraded Kitchen and Bar will not be cheap, so we will be holding fundraising events and will be seeking grants in order to reach our goal, as well as doing as much as we can ourselves to save costs.

Commercial Dishwasher (already on order) New Microwave New worktops, sink, hand-wash sink This will of course take time, but we are determined the results will allow, along with the improvements already carried out, greater scope to use the hall and its facilities for groups & private events, large or small and for the hall to be a bright, clean happy venue with good facilities for local people to enjoy in a variety of ways. Judging by many comments we gratefully receive when people first see the hall, we are on the right track!

### NATURAL HISTORY CLUB

Summer is almost officially over as I write this and will be over by the time you read it. Autumn officially starts 23rd September this year.

This has been the driest summer on record I believe and it has taken its toll on not just the grass, trees and other plant life, but on insects, birds and animals.

This was reflected at our last meeting on 15th September where members reported that nesting Swallows were leaving after having just one brood. Usually they will go on to have a second brood or even a third. Being insectivores, It can only be the lack of insects that has made them leave. The same can be said of House Martins and Swifts. Numbers of all these returning birds were down this year.

However, Red Kites seem to have moved into our area and are almost becoming a daily sight as they hang gracefully on thermals. Contrary to belief they are not a serious threat to domestic animals and poultry. Although they are capable of taking a live chicken, they much prefer the easy option of eating carrion. They will scavenge for scraps!

The possibility of a pair of Great White Egrets breeding near Westbury was reported. These are the same family as our Grey Herons only larger and completely white. These have been a rare visitor in recent years. Not to be confused with the smaller, more common, Little Egret.

It is now the start of the fungus season. The wetter weather giving rise to such wonderfully named fungi such as 'Black edged shield', The Blusher' 'Artists Bracket' 'Brown Rollrim' and 'Dyer's Mazegrill'. All seen and recorded in local woodland by a member.

Also at our meeting, one member brought along a collection of bugs and insects from around the world. These were fascinating to examine (they were dead but preserved) and you probably wouldn't want to meet a live one!

With the upcoming talk in St. Mary's Church in October on Hedgehogs by one of the UK's experts, It was decided the planned talk by one of our members on Hedgehogs be cancelled. So as an impromptu presentation I showed some videos and photographs of the wildlife that visits my garden as captured by my trailcam. This included a fox having an altercation with a local cat!

Our next meeting will be on Thursday 1st December at 7:30pm at the Methodist Church Hall, High Street, Steeple Ashton. The short talk to be determined. everyone welcome.

### Autumn – a time for giving and receiving

At this time of year there is a lot of giving and receiving and offering thanks. On Sunday 9 October we will celebrate Harvest Festival and give thanks for all the good things we receive from God's great creation and all who work on the land. Details of the day's services are on a separate page. At the beginning of November, we give thanks for the lives of the saints and those close to us who we see no more. On Remembrance Sunday, we give thanks for all who made the ultimate sacrifice in the great wars of the 20th century.

Then as Christmas gets closer our thoughts turn to what we will give to others. Not just the presents we buy for our friends and family, but what we give to people in great need. It works both ways since anyone in Steeple Ashton who wishes to support Operation Christmas Child can attend the service at St Thomas and anyone in North Bradley, Southwick or Heywood who wishes to support the Salvation Army can come along to the Gift Service. Also, both appeals will support families taking refuge from the war in Ukraine. The Salvation Army is in touch with those in this country, while Operation Christmas Child has stated that two-thirds of the shoeboxes donated in the UK will go to families in Ukraine, or those who have found refuge in Eastern European countries such as Moldova and Romania.

As Christian churches, we thank God for all the good things that we receive and we express our thanks in what we give to others, particularly in these months that culminate in the great festival of Christmas.



### Bryan writes...

This 1884 image is the earliest known photo of this part of Church Street. It was taken in front of Longs Villas and features Kitty Raymond with her baby sister Renie in the pushchair. They lived with their parents at the east end of Longs Villas – No 6 Church Street, where the road turns north towards the church.

The story of how I recently acquired the above image began in July this year, with a request from Pamela Pittard – a very distant Australian relation of mine – asking if I could help an American lady named Felicity Arnold (nee Prosser). Pamela had contacted Felicity after browsing an ancestry website and had helped her solve a family history question. Pamela was now asking for my help in answering more questions from Felicity regarding Steeple Ashton.

Felicity was born in Bristol but is now living in North America. Her childhood memories included trips to Steeple Ashton with her parents during the 1970s to visit George and Ethel Burbidge, who retired to a bungalow in St Marys after living for many years in Church Street. While living at No 7 Church Street, George and Ethel were neighbours to Felicity's great aunt Louie Raymond, who lived at No 5, next to the village hall (George and Ethel later moved to No 5 after the death of Lou Raymond). Felicity was trying to find out exactly where her maiden aunt Lou Raymond had lived, along with her widowed sister Kitty Prosser (nee Raymond) and her brother-in-law Frank Prosser.

I was able confirm where Lou Raymond lived, as my younger brother Terry and I had our photo taken in Lou Raymond's garden by a Mr Prosser around 1950.



I could also remember Lou Raymond being the caretaker of the village hall next door. Rosie Brett Green could also remember both Lou Raymond and Frank Prosser, and that Frank was an artist. Rosie has inherited one of his paintings, which was given to her grandfather, Herbert Smith, who was the village blacksmith and a neighbour of Frank.

At this stage I was not aware that the Raymond family originally lived in the house on the corner of Church Street – No 6 at the east end of Longs Villas. I stumbled on confirmation of the fact while checking for more information on that terrace of 19th-century houses in the 1989 book by Rosie's mother, the late Betty Smith, entitled 'Our Wiltshire Village, Steeple Ashton'.



Betty Smith writes...

The Gabled houses on the right-hand side of the road, going down towards the main road, appear today just as they did on the old drawing of the village from the church tower, with neat, fancy tiles, decorated roof ridges and tall gable ends. I feel they were initially built for some of the higher grade of servants of the Longs' Estate. The design and space in them is superior to most of their cottage neighbours.

The one on Church Street corner was occupied for many years by one of the Rood Ashton household staff. Two daughters of the household married two brothers named Prosser. Mr Frank Prosser regularly read the lessons and preached at the church on his frequent visits to the village. He was also an artist who painted many oil colour pictures of the neighbourhood. One of Vine Cottage (later The Sanctuary), pre-1914, shows the house with a thatched roof exactly as I first remember it.

Betty writes of Lou Raymond:

After the sale of the Longs' Estate Miss Raymond moved out of the Longs Villas house to make way for the new owner, ... the Raymond's unmarried daughter found life difficult in her old age and to sustain herself she undertook to clean the church and act as caretaker of the village hall. In this latter occupation she was viewed askance by the younger generation, for she sat in at the social evenings and did her best to keep the young from mischief, from her seat by the stove. I passed the above information to Felicity in a series of emails, during which time she kept me more informed on her side of the story. Felicity was aware that her great uncle Frank Prosser was an artist as she and her family have several of his paintings, but she was not aware that at least one (of The Sanctuary) still exists in Steeple Ashton.

Felicity confirmed that Frank Prosser was her great uncle – husband of Kitty Raymond – and brother of her grandfather Edwin Prosser, who married Renie Raymond (confirming two brothers married two sisters).

Felicity was not aware that her grandmother Renie had lived in Longs Villas, but she confirmed that both her great-great grandfather and great grandfather had worked as carpenter/joiners "for the Longs, mainly at the house in Rood Ashton." Felicity had sent me the photo of her grandmother Renie in the pushchair attended by her great aunt Kitty, saying: "I think this was taken in Steeple Ashton, but I don't know where." I was able to tell her that it was in Church Street, close to Longs Villas where the family lived.

Felicity also sent me another image of her grandmother Renie. Taken in 1898 when she was aged 14, it shows Renie with three of her dolls at what appears to be the front door of their Longs Villas home.



Lastly, after removing the 1950 photo of my brother Terry and I from an album in order to scan it, I discovered the following on the back:



Felicity thinks these initials were her father Alex and his two brothers, and that they must have run a small photographic business together. So, it could have been Alex that took our photo, before Felicity was born. **Bryan Berrett**
