Memorial Plaque of Peter Crooke, who died in 1633

Peter Crooke was a prominent Steeple Ashton clothier, and one of the last to live here before the industry moved to local towns to take advantage of the available water power. His brass memorial, inscribed with his clothier's mark, is in the stone floor of the Lady Chapel in St Mary's Church — denoting the final resting place of this benevolent resident. Crooke left money in trust to both St Mary's Church and the poor of Steeple Ashton.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Wednesday 23rd April at 7.30 pm in the Village Hall. This is a meeting of the parish and its local groups and organisations and all residents are cordially invited to attend. There will be updates and reports on current PC projects, the Neighbourhood Plan and local groups are invited to also present reports. Refreshments will be available – please do come along!

Keevil Airfield Activity Mar - May 2023

The Parish Council has been advised that the military is conducting several training exercises, which involve both ground troops and aircraft during a week in late March, and again Mid-Apr to Mid-May. Local residents may be aware of increased military vehicles and personnel in the vicinity during this period. A small installation is being created on the airfield which requires aggregate, deliveries scheduled to take place in late March. The RAF has assured the PC that it will do its utmost to minimise disruption in the local area.

Parish Council Vacancies

The PC has received confirmation that no election has been called to fill the vacancy arising from the resignation of Cllr Francis Ash. The Council may now proceed to co-opt a new member. At the current time the PC has four vacancies.

We would welcome new recruits, particularly to make our council more diverse to better represent our village population.

New members can be co-opted to the council through a simple vote, there is no need to go through an election process. You do need to be over 18 years old and have lived or worked in the parish for the past 12 months.

Bryan writes...

The Peter Crook memorial plaque featured on the front cover is inscribed as follows:

Here lieth ye body of Peter Crooke who deceas'd ye 8. of April 1633 who gave to this Church XXs & to ye poore of this towne Xs a yeare for ever

The sums mentioned are 20 shillings (£1) and 10 shillings (50p).

Below this inscription are two more (presumed) members of Peter's family, both named Roger Crooke, who died in 1655 and 1675.

In 1977, the Charity Commission for England & Wales amalgamated five small charities relating to the parish of Steeple Ashton, under the title The Charity of Crooke & Others. Today, the trustees of this charity administer the income from these five village charities – including the income from Luffenham Meadow gifted in the will of Samuel Martyn in 1643.

The following paragraph is extracted from a lengthy report on the charities of the parish of Steeple Ashton, dated 10 July 1833:

Samuel Martyn, of Eastown, who died 12th November 1643, gave by Will to six trustees therein named, their heirs and assigns for ever, a close of meadow or pasture, with the appurtenances, called Luffnam*, containing by estimation two acres, lying in the parish of Steeple Ashton, between Alberry and Oakhill, upon trust that every year for ever after his decease there should be given at Martinmas, out of the rents and profits thereof, two coats of frieze or other fitting cloth unto two poor men, and

two gowns, of the same frieze or other cloth, unto two poor women, of the tithings of West Ashton and Steeple Ashton.

* [Otherwise Luffingham or Luffenham.]

The 'Oxford Dictionary' (1995) describes a meadow as a "piece of grassland, esp. used for hay; low ground, esp. near river."

Luffenham remains much as it was in Samuel Martyn's day. This unusual-shaped meadow lies in a small valley half-way along the footpath between Steeple Ashton and West Ashton, and is bordered along the southwest side by a brook, crossed by a stone-built footbridge which was restored by The Friends of Steeple Ashton in 2020.

LUFFENHAM NEEDS NEW FRIENDS!

The Friends of Steeple Ashton – who have been the tenants of Luffenham since November 2005 – are to disband in April. The trustees of The Charity of Crooke & Others have received an individual offer to maintain the field in its present state during the coming months; and if required, a local farmer who has been carrying out the annual late-summer cut is willing to continue the hay-cutting, taking the baled hay in payment.

However, this voluntary arrangement is only a short-term answer, and would not contribute to the total income required by the trust to enable it to fully perform its legal obligations. Ideally, a new group or organisation would need to be formed to continue the excellent work

previously carried out by Tony Evans and Geoff Witts on behalf of the FOSA, in managing this important nature amenity for both present and future generations.

During 2021, the trustees of The Charity of Crooke & Others sought advice on the sustainable management of Luffenham from Wiltshire Wildlife Trust. As a result, a site visit was arranged for June 1. Water Team Manager Alice Baker and Reserves Officer (Central) Matt Callaway attended, accompanied by representatives of the FOSA and the trustees of The Charity of Crooke & Others.

Subsequently, Alice and Matt produced a comprehensive, illustrated six-page WWT report, containing comments on and advice for the sustainable care and management of the meadow, trees, hedgerows and stream. This report has been adopted as the template and guide for future tenants, and is available on request.

The trust of The Charity of Crooke & Others is due to meet in May – by which time the trustees hope that this article will have encouraged volunteers to step forward enabling new tenants to be selected. If interested parties wish to discuss further, please phone Bryan Berrett, on 01380 870480.

Richard writes...

One of the Bible readings for Easter Sunday – indeed, a required reading – comes from Acts Chapter 10. We find Peter telling Cornelius about the death and resurrection of Jesus. Cornelius is described as a centurion of the Italian cohort.....a devout man who feared God with all his household. Here he is, as this picture by Gerbrand van den Eeckhout shows.

Cornelius is a big strong man wearing his helmet and armour. He has a sword, and an axe on the floor. He's a tough guy – a Roman soldier, part of the army who killed Jesus. But he's also a Christian. So, it's not just women and fishermen from Galilee who believed in Jesus.

In the picture, Cornelius is visited by a man in dazzling clothes – an angel - who invites him to send for Peter, so that he can hear about Jesus. Peter tells us how the story of Jesus' resurrection had spread throughout Judea, and here is this Italian soldier hearing it as well. It is similar to the Easter story – the person in white who strikes terror not only into the hearts of the disciples who came to the tomb, but also into this great strong man from another country and culture. In Cornelius too we hear an echo of the Roman centurion who stood at the foot of the cross and declared as Jesus died – 'Truly this man was God's Son'.

But we can go back to before the writing of the Gospels to hear mention of Jesus' resurrection. Paul's letters to the early church were written 20 years before the Gospels, yet in one to the church in Corinth he states – 'Have I not seen the Lord? '. Paul mentions all the people who saw the risen Jesus – over 500, including Peter – and himself – 'Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared to me'.

These stories and testimonies of the Risen Jesus emphasise just how big the story is. Something utterly remarkable happened in those days to provoke such a response. They show that Jesus was fundamentally different to the many other preachers and upstart leaders that abounded in Roman occupied Israel at the time, and he has had a massive influence on the world over the last two millenia. Peter speaks to Cornelius of how every nation where anyone fears God and does what is right is acceptable to God.

The Easter story is an amazing one that demands a response from us as well. The post-resurrection appearances of Jesus of which Paul speaks were the driving force in his ministry to the early churches, and Jesus himself stated that if any wanted to be his followers, they must take up their crosses and follow him. That is a challenge to us as well as we move on from Easter into the future.

THE 2023 EDINGTON ARTS CHORAL WORKSHOP



Something rather different this year on Saturday 20th May when Jeremy Summerly will be leading a choral workshop in Edington Priory Church, working with us on a number of Spirituals from an edition compiled and arranged by Bob Chilcott.

These beautiful songs well repay some in-depth attention, and will challenge us to explore a different kind of singing. Jeremy, well-known broadcaster and Director of the Edington Festival Consort, will give a short talk on their history and context before we get down to business. Some of the spirituals will be familiar (though we may remember them wrongly!) and others will be new to us. Either way, it will be a rewarding day's music lead by a knowledgeable musician and experienced and tolerant educator.

The day will run from registration at 9.30am, till approximately 4.30pm, ending with a run-through for family and friends after tea and cake to which all are welcome. 





Local Police Report



The Melksham Neighbourhood Policing Team were delighted to meet a number of Steeple Ashton residents at a recent drop-in session we held at the Village shop. It proved to be a good opportunity to re-forge some old working relationships that had been lost over the preceding years of austerity. This is something we're also doing with our Parish Councils, to make sure that we're ahead of any local concerns as they arise.

We're working hard to get into the rural communities as best we can and be visible, but we're having to be clever about how we do this. Our staffing still isn't what it once was, so we try to make best use of technology to do our jobs effectively. Part of this involves being data-driven in how we set our Priorities; the other part of this involves using Social Media to talk about what we're working on as a team.

Steeple Ashton is a beautiful village, which is fortunate enough to experience near-unparalleled low rates of crime and anti-social behaviour. In fact, we've only seen four organic reports from the Village over the last 12 months; of those, only one was a recordable crime. This is against a backdrop of 21,000 Crimes and Incidents for the wider Trowbridge, Melksham and Bradford on Avon area that's serviced by our 5 Response Teams and Neighbourhood Team. Now, we know that's not a reason to abandon the Village, but hopefully it goes some of the way towards explaining why a lot of our engagement will be online.

So, what can you expect from us over the next 12 months or so?

With some renewed investment into Neighbourhood Policing, we have named colleagues who are specifically responsible for dealing with longer-term problems in "Melksham Rural South", which Steeple Ashton is a part of. Your Melksham Team consists of PC Jen Miller, PC Ben Coombs; PCSO Mel Culliford; PCSO Vic Rolph and myself, Sgt James Twyford. We all cover the entire Melksham area, but we're gradually introducing extra capacity, which in the fullness of time will open up more opportunities for face-to-face engagements.

The Force have re-invested heavily in Roads Policing lately. We've recruited a mixture of Speed Enforcement Officers with the powers to prosecute offenders; plus Road Safety Officers, who are charged with looking at road safety more holistically. Their focus is on the "Fatal Five" – Drink / Drug Driving, Mobile Phone use, Excess Speed and Seatbelt

offences. The Road Safety Officers also look at ways to promote a number of road safety initiatives and work with other agencies to reduce the capacity for offences to be committed on the roads.

As Steeple Ashton has always featured on the list of locations where Speeding has been a problem; it will doubtlessly feature in the rotation of sites used by all of these colleagues.

We've also started a Monthly Report to our Parish Councils. This is aimed at giving everyone a more detailed breakdown of what we've been up to, whilst promoting two-way conversations.

The last thing I wanted to write about, was how best to report things to us and how to communicate with us in the easiest way possible. Truth be told; we're probably guilty of having too many ways of getting in touch, but it can be simplified:

In an Emergency, where there's a risk to life or property, dial 999.

For anything else, the phone number is 101; or you can report concerns online at wiltshire.police.uk if it's non-urgent. Incidents are prioritised based on threat, harm and risk; not the method by which they're reported.

As I mentioned above, we're becoming increasingly data-driven, so reporting of incidents is key. All too often we hear anecdotal evidence coming in from our partner agencies, which isn't substantiated by crime data.

It's really important that when you experience an issue, it gets reported to us directly. Even if there's nothing that can be done about an incident in isolation; we'd still rather know about it, so we can better inform our Priorities. It's also important not to believe online comments like "we've reported this to the Police"; experience tells me that more often than not, they haven't.

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
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
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Friends of Steeple Ashton Oil Scheme

A Tribute to Richard Matthews, 21st Dec 1939 – 19th Feb 2023



When I was asked to contribute my recollections of Richard's early years to his eulogy in the church, the memories came flooding back, so his family decided it would be better if I were to present them as a separate tribute here.

Memories of Richard

Richard and I always had a great relationship, and when I think of him it is with great fondness. Whether he was in the shop having coffee, on his bike, or in his car, he would always stop to say hello and discuss the topic of the day, or ask about my aging aunt Louisa, or my cousin Pat who had been his playmate as a child. His knowledge of the village was legendary, and he would often correct me if I had written something wrong in the newsletter. I would retort: "I put that in there just so I know you have read it Richard." He would laugh and go on his way.

Richard was born in the farmhouse at Bartletts Farm, Steeple Ashton, on 21st December 1939.

As some of you know, I tend to 'go on a bit' about my family history here in Steeple Ashton. Richard would soon cut me down to size by saying: "Ah, but you weren't born here, were you Bryan" – which is quite true.

Like Richard, I was born in a farmhouse; not here in Steeple Ashton, but on a cider farm in Thornbury, Gloucestershire, where my parents were lodging after their house was damaged in the worst of the Bristol bombing during the early part of WWII. When I was five years old in 1947, we joined my grandfather here, at Moorfield in Church Street, the family farm.

Consequently, in recent years, if I wanted to learn more about life in the village during the war, I would ask Richard; and if on a rare occasion he couldn't help, there was always his aunty – dear old Mary Ashby.

When Richard's daughter Sally asked me if I could write some of my recollections of events from Richard's youth, I was reminded of how different things were in Steeple Ashton 60 or 70 years ago. In those far-off days, the village was surrounded by elm trees bordering green fields populated by herds of grazing dairy cows, plus a limited amount of arable land. Between Sandpits Lane and Silver Street there were nine individual dairy farms, mostly situated in the High Street. A few of these were still milking cows by hand. The herds were varied: Shorthorn, Ayrshire, Friesian, and Jersey, and often a mixture of breeds in a herd.

Richard and I grew up on our family farms. We learned to hand-milk cows and we both left school at the age of 15 to start a seven-day working week, getting up before 6am to begin the milking. (This came naturally to us, as from the age of 14 we had been getting up early to do it before school.)

In those days, during haymaking and harvest time, some of the farmers would group together to help each other out by providing labour, or machines, or both. No money changed hands as I recall, and things usually balanced out. If not, goods or cattle-feed would usually be exchanged. Our two families got on well together, and my father Ken considered Richard's father Bill to be one of his very best friends – so we always enjoyed working with them on Bartletts Farm at harvest time. I well remember Richard's granny, old Mrs Matthews, walking across the fields with a full basket to bring us bread and cheese and a flask of tea.

When my grandfather was alive, we would host a Harvest Supper at Moorfield to repay casual helpers and extended family members who had turned up to help during haymaking. There was always plenty of cider, cooked ham, cheese, pickles, and lots of merriment!

This idyllic lifestyle was not to last, as things changed dramatically for both Richard and I during 1958 – but more of that later.

I could never catch up with Richard. He beat me in every way; not only was he two years older than me – he was two years and one day older than me!

During our early years Richard was one of the 'bigger boys'. Those two years meant a lot when we were young. I remember that Richard was amongst some of those older naughty boys who would often creep down Butts Lane where there was an old car parked in the farmyard belonging to Thorn House Farm (later the farmyard housed Graham Chappell's

Butcher's Shop; it's now the home of Helen Montague-Smith). One of those older boys would then creep behind the car, open the driver's door, and keep his hand on the horn until old 'Poley' White would come out and chase them with his stick, but never catch them.

I followed them one day, and when old 'Poley' came out I tried to run away – but I couldn't run fast enough as I was wearing by grandfather's Wellington boots! (Don't ask me why). I didn't think he would really hit me; but when I got home it was difficult explaining to my mother the red marks on the backs of my legs. Needless to say, Richard and the rest got well away.

As I said, Richard always seemed to beat me in every way. He even had a special milking stool with one leg instead of three. Apparently, he could stick it in the ground when milking in the open fields — or was he kidding me?!!

As young teenagers Richard and I drove tractors on our family farms. These were not the cosy-cabbed monsters of today; if it rained you got wet! His was bigger – a Fordson Major, with a facility to brake either of the back wheels and turn 180 degrees on the spot (useful for ploughing). My family's tractor was an old Fordson Standard with a combined clutch and brake, neither of which worked properly!

His farm was about 70 acres supporting around 20 or 30 cows. We had 16 cows and just 32 acres!

Not only that – the Matthews family had two farmhouses! (10 and 12 High Street.)

In our later teenage years, I had an old 350cc Velocette motorcycle with pneumatic front forks and no rear suspension – probably cool now, but not then.

Richard had a brand-new powder-blue 35occ twin-cylinder Triumph Twenty-One with the rear suspension encased in an all-round fairing. They became known as the 'Bathtub' model – state of the art in the late 1950s and early 6os. His friend Johnnie Jelfs had exactly the same model in the same colour. They would park them side-by-side outside the Longs Arms, before roaring off together – to wherever the action was – I never knew where, probably to the next group of girls.

I said that both our lives changed in 1958. For me it was the sale of our farm in the September. Moorfield Farm had always been difficult to manage, with its fields laying scattered west of the village, and the farmhouse, yard and cowsheds isolated in Church Street. So, my parents sold the farmhouse and land separately, and purchased the grocery shop at

the entrance to Acreshort Lane from Victor Ashby – Richard's uncle (and Mary's father) – following his retirement.

Earlier that year it had been far more dramatic for Richard and his family – with the loss of their father Bill at the age of 44. He had passed away after a long and progressive illness. Richard's brother and sister Bill junior and Rene were still at school. This left 18-year-old Richard as head of the grieving family with his mother, and no one else apart from his Grampy Hugh Matthews, Grampy George Austin, and Uncle Charlie Orchard to turn to for help and advice.

I can remember my mother coming home in tears after meeting Richard in the Post Office (now The Old Merchants Hall) and worrying how on earth he was going to manage. I have only learned now, in the past week, that it was there in the Post Office with my mother present that Richard heard of his father's death – and was told to go straight home.

The local famers did what they could to help, especially the Pike family of East Town Farm, West Ashton, who gave unforgettable assistance. With this support Richard managed to make his family farm survive – and eventually prosper.

A very young Derek Jefferies was taken on straight from school to help, which later proved to be a very wise decision. Subsequently, Rene and Derek married in 1964.

In 1970, Richard's younger brother Bill, having previously worked for six years on his Uncle Charlie's farm in Keevil, joined the business aged 21.

Richard had met Moira while she was living at Steeple Ashton Manor as nanny for the children of Lord and Lady Long (the 4th Viscount Richard and Margaret), and they married in 1971. Moira was a loving partner and a tremendous support to Richard for the rest of her life. He missed her terribly following her passing in 2021.

After meeting at a barn dance, Bill and Sandra were married at St John's Church West Ashton in 1978, with Richard as best man.

Bartletts Farm was now supporting three families. Eventually these growing families had to change their business plan; they decided to give up milking in 1979 and diversify by expanding the contracting side of the business, which was beginning to grow – and the Matthews & Jefferies Agricultural Contracting Partnership was formed.

They quickly built a reputation for the quality of their work. The partnership continued to flourish for many years and through difficult times, until 2008 – when Derek decided to retire at the age of 65. Richard was then approaching 69, and he decided to join Derek in retirement – which happened to be 50 years after taking over the farm on the death of

his father.

Richard's brother Bill and his wife Sandra took over the farm and contracting business, in partnership with their son Peter, renaming it WG & PW Matthews. Both Derek and Richard could still be seen helping out from time to time, during busy periods.

In 2018, very sadly, Derek died, aged 74. Richard carried on helping for a few more years as and when he was needed, particularly at hedge cutting time, which he always enjoyed. He was renowned for the neatness of his work, and if a farmer asked him to "just give it a quick whizz over", Richard would refuse: it was his way or no way!

For many years, Richard, Moira and other members of the family, kept a watchful eye on Richard's ageing aunts — Mary Ashby and Dorothy Rogers — both of whom were living independently in Acreshort Lane. With more time on his hands following retirement, and the health of both aunts deteriorating, Richard continued to look out for them for the rest of their lives. His bike could often be seen left near, or propped against, the wall of either home. Sadly, both Mary and Dorothy died in 2021. Following Dorothy's death, Richard continued to look after the stray cat that she had provided food and shelter for at her bungalow, and Moira had also cared for.

Today, there are no milking cows grazing in the fields around the village. Farming practices are also far different from the days of Richard's father and grandfather. But the land of Bartletts Farm is still productive, and the contracting business continues to flourish within the family.

It's almost 65 years since Richard took over Bartletts Farm in tragic circumstances. Over the passing decades, the Matthews and Jefferies extended families have grown to become a wonderful example of country family life. Always helping and looking out for each other while remaining a well-respected and important part of the community. Richard was rightly proud of all of you, and the village will never forget him. **Bryan Berrett**

Shearman's Shears

Following on from last month's article about Thomas Helliker, I wanted you to see this image of a complete pair of shears. (It is being held by George Lansdown, father of Charles, editor of The Wiltshire Times, the former gave the shears to Trowbridge Museum where they are on display). This amazing tool was used by the shearman to remove the fine wool fibres (the nap) of woollen cloth which had been raised by brushing with teasels. It was supported on a horizontal bench, on top of which was spread the cloth to be 'sheared'.





The shearman used the wooden handle attached to the back blade to pull this forward to engage with the front blade and thus cut off the nap. His job was considered to be one of the most skilled in the whole process of turning raw wool into finished cloth. WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR NEWS FROM JONATHON SEED

Spring is always a lovely time in England and a particularly pleasant time in Wiltshire. This year we have an Easter in early April and time to enjoy the daffodils, emerging hedgerows, grass, wildlife and all the other signs of our countryside waking up after a long winter of quieter activity.

There is plenty going on in local government both locally and in County Hall. I have also been quite active as your local Wiltshire Councillor in recent weeks. I try to attend as many of the six monthly Parish Council meetings as I can as well as getting involved with local community groups and taking up issues where I feel I can make a difference on your behalf. Recently these issues have included the Semington Bus Gate where we are making real progress with Wiltshire Council commitment to an Automatic Number Plate Recognition camera

to enforce against illegal use of the route. I have also been active on the Common Hill flooding and carriageway repairs issue together with Great Hinton road verge repairs. Just three of many bubbling local issues!

County Hall matters have presented their own challenges. I generally support the administration of my Party and I think we are doing an exceptionally competent job in running the finances of the County, particularly when compared to those of neighbouring authorities. However it is also part of my remit as a senior backbencher to challenge decisions about which I have concerns. One of these issues is the Council campaign to increase recycling rates. I agree that we should be doing all that we can to improve recycling in Wiltshire. However I question and have challenged any rummaging through bins by Council officials and fundamentally disagree with any refusal to empty bins as a result. I take the view that we pay our Council tax to have bins emptied and not to have them left unemptied with red cards put on them. I have made this very clear to the new Cabinet member for Waste. I hope that in future he will consider waste initiatives more carefully alongside the needs and wishes of the Council Tax paying residents of Wiltshire.

Finally I am making an increased effort to communicate with residents via social media. Steeple Ashton Recreation Working Group – March 2023 Update

Shortly after the COVID lockdowns, a small group of local residents began meeting up once per month with the aim of improving some of the recreational areas around the village, after responding to the Parish Council's request for volunteers. This Rec Group began with a broad remit, looking at what could be done at St Mary's field, the Newleaze playground and Acreshort Park, as well as other areas such as Luffenham field. We spent some time poring over the 2019 village survey, picking out various themes and trends and looking at how we might address them. In very broad terms, we reached the following conclusions:

Acreshort Park does not need too much attention in the immediate future having recently had some excellent additions;

Newleaze park is fit for the age group it is intended for, although requires some TLC and maintenance;

St Mary's is felt by the majority of the population to be an underused space which could benefit from the most improvements.

With the above in mind, we have used the findings of the village survey to come up with 3 broad concepts for better utilisation of St Mary's playing field. We are in the process of putting finishing touches to our proposals, which we'll then present to the village for consultation, beginning at the Annual Parish Meeting on 26 April.

Please put the above date (26 April) in your calendars and look out for the questionnaires which will be circulated thereafter, with both online and paper versions available. We really want to have the opinions of the village so that what we finally set to work on is reflective of the needs and wishes of the community. This is a fantastic opportunity for us to make some considerable upgrades for our residents, both now and into the future.
