PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Parish Council Vacancies

At the current time the PC has four vacancies. We would welcome new recruits, particularly to make our council more diverse to better represent our village population.

New members can be co-opted to the council through a simple vote, there is no need to go through an election process. You do need to be over 18 years old and have lived or worked in the parish for the past 12 months.

Information on Ball Games in parish recreation areas and playing fields

At the July PC meeting members considered the rules to be applied to parish recreation and play areas in respect of ball games and resolved the following, having heard from members of the public and noting their comments:

- Village Green the current policy of no ball games would be maintained and the appropriate signage re-instated.
- Acreshort Park small, unorganised ball games would be permitted and appropriate signage would be drafted. Interested parties and local residents would be consulted on the wording.
- St Marys Rec would remain the focus for larger, organised ball games. The PC would investigate the purchase of a small, permanent goal and would liaise with the contractor to ensure the grass was maintained at an appropriate length. The recent project to purchase a mower for volunteer use at Keevil was noted and residents expressed an interest in raising funds for a similar project in Steeple Ashton, which was encouraged.
- Newleaze Playground the current policy of no ball games would be maintained.

Regional Gliding Champs coming to Wiltshire

Bannerdown Gliding Club, based on Keevil Airfield, will be hosting the Bannerdown Regional Gliding Competition including the Interservices Championships from 5-13 August. There will be approximately 45 competition sailplanes conducting cross country flights throughout the week, depending on the weather.

Throughout the week if you happen to look up you may see the fleet of gliders circling overhead as the pilots prepare to start the race, or see them cruising towards the finish line towards the end of the day. The gliders are launched in late morning or early afternoon using powered tug aircraft. This is completed in approximately 90 minutes and the gliders are released in different locations each day depending on the conditions and course that has been set.

During the week you might see competition crews with glider trailers arriving or leaving the airfield if they need to collect gliders that have landed away from site. You may also see more vehicles and caravans at the start and end of the week as pilots and their crews arrive to stay at the airfield. All competition attendees will be specifically briefed on care when driving in the local area, villages and community. VILLAGE SHOPVOLUNTEERS WANTED

If you've ever thought you'd like to be involved in the village shop as a volunteer, but weren't sure what the roles were, hopefully this will help clarify. It is a very social place and a good place to meet villagers who you my not meet on a day-to-day basis. The shop is all volunteer run, apart from the Manager role, and you are guaranteed a warm welcome, you'll make new friends and you will have a laugh.

Shifts are 2 hours generally, and FULL TRAINING WILL BE GIVEN. You can have a regular shift, or just volunteer for 'fill ins' (cover sickness, holidays, appointments). There's lots of choice.

There are different roles;

BAKERS

This doesn't mean you have to knead dough and create magnificent mille feuille! It just requires you to put ready prepared doughs for breads, croissants, sausage rolls and pasties into the ovens and cook them. The shift is an early one; 07.30 - 8.30 ish, so suits the early risers.

COFFEE SHOP

This involves; making teas, coffees and other drinks (there is a coffee machine). Making sandwiches and serving cakes. Clearing up after each customer, and loading the dishwasher. Some customers do takeaways.

Assisting with pricing of new stock and putting it away, and checking the shelves (particularly the chilled items) for stock going out of date soon. Stock comes into the shop on different days and times. It varies.

TILL

Entering the products and taking the money. Processing any credit card payments. Answering the phone and dealing with customer queries.

GENERAL HOUSEKEEPING JOBS

The Madness of King George (GB), 107 minutes (directed by Nicholas Hytner, and with Nigel Hawthorne, Helen Mirren, Ian Holm, Rupert Everett, Geoffrey Palmer...) is to be shown on **Friday**, **25th August**; and

The Prairie Home Companion (US), 105 minutes (directed by Robert

Altman and with Kevin Kline, Meryl Streep ...), is to be shown on **Friday**, **29th September.**

Tickets are £5 each, and will be **on sale on the door from 7 pm**. Each film will start at **7.30 pm**. Wine and soft drinks will be available at a modest price before the film starts. Afterwards there will be an opportunity for informal discussion about the film.

Of **The Madness of King George**, Derek Malcolm wrote in *The Guardian*:

"Essentially it is Hawthorne's triumph and no one else's, since he provides the holding centre without which the rest might have seemed an ephemeral romp, uncertain as to whether to comment on its own times or ours and drifting towards parody in both instances".

Described in *Halliwell* as a "delectable swansong to the career of its great director Robert Altman", the **The Prairie Home Companion** starts as the long-running live radio variety show of that name prepares for its final broadcast - unbeknown to the listening audience. The radio station's new parent company has scheduled the show's home, the storied Fitzgerald Theater, for demolition, and dispatched "the Axeman" to judge whether to save the show...

Details of the films we will be showing up until Christmas will appear in October's issue. Fr Oliver


STEEPLE ASHTON OIL SCHEME

The results of the community questionnaire and analysis of the Steering Group have been drawn together to create a Vision and set of Objectives for the Neighbourhood Development Plan. The Vision and Objectives will be used to guide the overall direction of the Plan and the policies that will be included.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN VISION

Maintain and enhance Steeple Ashton's strong sense of community spirit and historic village character as a distinct rural settlement. Village identity to be retained.

Small-scale development will meet needs of local people, attract a diverse community, with a thriving population of all ages.

The natural environment throughout and surrounding the parish, the biodiversity and important historic assets will be enhanced and protected.

The community will be at the core of all future development. Steeple Ashton will be an accessible and safe space for all with enhanced footways, cycle routes and bridleways, and improved traffic management.

Steeple Ashton will contribute to the net zero carbon targets as all new development will meet maximum energy efficiency standards, use renewable energy sources, and employ a high level of flood resilience

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN OBJECTIVES

- To retain the thriving village identity of Steeple Ashton and ensure sustainable development is of a scale appropriate to the size of the village and local community.
- To ensure future housing responds to locally generated needs, with an emphasis on family homes, starter homes, and housing for the older population, is of a high standard of design, and fits well into the context of the Parish in terms of type, mix, scale and character.
- To identify, protect and enhance Steeple Ashton's heritage assets and key public spaces, including the conservation area and setting of listed buildings. Ensure that any future development reflects modern day living whilst being sympathetic to the existing character and heritage of the Parish.
- To protect the community facilities, including the St Marys church, the village shop and post office and the Longs Pub, and encourage provision of additional facilities and amenities.
- To ensure new development is supported by the necessary services and infrastructure, including coverage of broadband and mobile networks.
- To protect and enhance the Parish's local open and recreational spaces, and improve access to and enjoyment of the countryside.
- To ensure that development does not impact our valued natural environment and provides benefits to the climate and biodiversity net gain.
- 8. To reduce the community's contribution to the future environmental impacts of climate change, encouraging development to meet net zero carbon standards through energy efficiency and renewable energy installations, as well as ensure the installation of sustainable drainage systems and flood resilience.
- To promote the environmental wellbeing and health of the residents of Steeple Ashton by providing safe and convenient access, by foot and bicycle, reducing vehicle congestion and pollution through encouraging the use of sustainable transport.
- 10. To encourage improvements for traffic management, particularly along the High Street, with a focus on safety and speed and ensure all new development provides sufficient levels of off-street parking.

Once funding is received from Central Government, we will be able to start the assessment on sites that were put forward by the Parish for development. The assessment will cover many aspects, and once assessed, we will organise a **public consultation** on the shortlisted sites



Keevil School welcomes surprising new staff member, Mr Moose

Children at Keevil Primary School couldn't believe their luck when they met their latest teaching assistant this month. A huge, hairy dog named Mr Moose.

The school has recruited the help of Mr Moose, a registered therapy dog who is trained to quietly listen to the schoolchildren read.

Mr Moose, a gigantic Irish Wolf-Hound, has been helping the children overcome any nervousness when reading aloud by visiting each classroom and patiently listening to pupils read their story books.

Early research suggests that listening dogs can help improve reading performance in children, and Keevil head teacher Lindsey Hermon says their initial observations reflect those conclusions.

"It's clear to see that the children read more confidently to Mr Moose. Pupils not only love reading to him, they appear to put aside any shyness or self-consciousness that may be holding back their reading performance."

"It is amazing to see not only their enthusiasm, but also the focus the children possess when reading to Mr Moose."

Mr Moose, and his volunteer owner Emily, were organised via Therapy Dogs Nationwide (TDN.ORG.UK), a registered charity that specialises in assessing and training would-be therapy dogs, and matching them up with suitable placements.

Therapy dogs and their owners also make visits to local hospitals, hospices, care homes, and other establishments

This week, Keevil School was thrilled to receive a set of outstanding Sats rt and Mrs Hermon believes their innovative approach to developing 'the whole child' has really helped the children thrive.

"Together with other teaching initiatives, we expect Mr Moose to strengthen the children's learning achievements even further this year. It's tremendous seeing the children thriving and becoming more confident. However, it's fair to say that we also simply love having Mr Moose at the school and seeing the pure delight on the children's faces".

NATURAL HISTORY CLUB

With June being the warmest month on record, July has started out looking like being the wettest! But there is plenty of time for that to change. At least it has given the plants a well needed boost.

Plenty of orchids are being spotted including Bee Orchid, Spider Orchid and Pyramidal Orchid which in turn attracts butterflies such as marbled whites.

Other butterflies are being seen such as Essex Skipper, White Admiral and Purple Hairstreaks along with the more common ones like Painted lady, Red Admiral and Tortoise Shell.

Let's not forget our moths. Did you know there are about 2,500 different species in the UK. Some reported recently with wonderful names are Buff Tip, Privit Hawkmoth and Burnett Moth.

Hares seem to be thriving locally with seven being reported in one field alone. These beautiful animals are usually nocturnal but can be seen foraging during the day. They rest and rear their young (Leverets) in 'forms' which are simply a scrape on the ground. They don't burrow like rabbits.

Last month (June) two Yellow Wagtails were seen locally in a field just off Sandpits lane. These are scarce summer visitors to this part of the UK and although they are the size and shape of the resident Pied Wagtails they are insectivores and as their name suggests, predominately yellow in colour. One of our members has had a pair or Stock Doves visiting his garden. This is highly unusual as they tend to be a bird of the woodland. Not as common as their cousin the Collared Dove and smaller than the Wood Pigeon they have a lovely iridescent plumage. Do not confuse them with the feral pigeons in town. These are hole nesters and often try to occupy Owl boxes.

A date for your diary. We have a local 'bat walk' arranged led by our own 'Bat Woman' Alison, which all are welcome to come on. We have about ten hand held bat detectors to use. We will be able to identify the species by 'listening' to them. The walk will be on Friday 25th August meeting at St. Mary's Church, Steeple Ashton at 8pm for an 8:15pm set off. Sunset is around 8:10pm that day.

Our next meeting is on Thursday 7th September at 7:30pm at the Methodist Church Hall, High Street, Steeple Ashton. The short talk is yet to be determined. Everyone welcome.

St Mary's playing field survey – the results are in!

A big **thank you** to everyone who completed the survey about improvements at St Mary's. We had **277 responses**, sharing views on the different options, lots of comments, ideas and enthusiasm.

Headline results

Respondents were asked to select their first and second choices from the three outline options. The three options were:

- 1 full sized football low cost and time to deliver
- 2 sports and play medium cost and time to deliver
- 3 fun for all high cost and time to deliver

The most popular first choice was option 2 – sports and play

Option - first choice 2 - sports and play	Quantity 44.8%
3 - fun for all	36.8%
1 - full sized football	18.4%

This was closely followed by option 3 - fun for all, with option 1 - full sized football – in third place.

Option 2 was also the most popular second choice, with 43.7%, followed by option 3 with 39.7% and option 1 with 16.6%.

What will happen next?

Using the results of this survey, the Rec Group is developing a final plan for improvements at St Mary's field. This will go to the Parish Council for consideration in September.

Once a plan is approved by the Parish Council, we'll hold an open meeting in the village hall to show the plans and information about next steps.

We'll then need to apply for funding to start bringing the plans to life. This will take time, but we'll aim to start some improvements as soon as possible, with more to follow over time as funds are raised.

Organ Pipes Extra

You may have seen a notice tied to the church gate inviting comments about the application which was described as 'Restoration of polychromatic organ pipe decoration'. We are now awaiting a decision about this project from the diocese.

To help visualise what the restored pipes might look like, I realised that my grand daughter was the person to consult. She seemed to think that producing an image was no problem. She took the background photograph in colour and then we had a detailed chat about the original colours of the designs on the pipes. I have a series of images from Robert Woodland and Debra Miller after they had stripped five of the pipes last autumn. They had told me about the original colours on the pipes, which had faded but which they could easily identify. The red they described as ox-blood, a lovely rich red. To my surprise, the 3 larger pipes on the edge of the facade, they assured me, were not blue but had a khaki background with cream flowers and only small blue areas around the mouths of the pipes. The central smaller pipes have a pale blue bacground with the red and pink decoration. All the facade has lots of gold areas which catch the light and make it look so special. I hope you agree that the total effect is very beautiful and should enhance our church. Helen
