Keevil Airfield, the evening of June 5th 1944

Stirling Heavy Bombers line up on Keevil Airfield 80 years ago, in preparation for Operation Tonga – part of Operation Overlord. Later that night, at 23.00 hrs, the first of a total of 46 of these fully-laden aircraft – each carrying 20 Paratroopers of the British 6th Airborne Division, powered by four Bristol-made Hercules engines – was to thunder down the main runway, turn east and barely clear the hills to the south. Their destination: Normandy – and the start of D-Day.

Parish Council elects new Chair for the municipal year 2024-25

At the Annual Council Meeting held on 1st May 2024 members elected Cllr Jon Tapper as the Chair for 2024-25, with Cllr Rob Leonard being elected as Vice-Chair.

Cllr Jon Tapper introduces himself below:

I became chairman of Steeple Ashton Parish Council in May.

I have lived and worked in the County all of my life, moving to the village with my wife Sharon, in November 2000.

I have worked in the public sector for over 42 years in a number of roles such as Community and Road safety which included working in partnership with other Statutory bodies such as the County Council to address local problems and issues.

I joined the Parish Council in November 2021, and I hoped the knowledge and experience gained during my working career would be of benefit to our local community.

During my time with the Parish Council, I have become involved with matters relating to Highways including footpaths, Community speed watch and liaison with the local policing team which has seen police visits recommence to our village shop and other events held within our village.

My wife and I will often be seen walking our wired haired dachshund Arthur around the village and surrounding areas exploring the beautiful countryside on our doorstep.

I would very much like to thank Robert Leonard for all his commitment and hard work as the previous Chairman of the Parish Council in particular to his focus on our Neighbourhood Plan and the repurposing of St Mary's Recreation field.

I am reassured that he will continue with his enthusiasm to support both myself and the Parish as the Vice Chairman of the Council.

Avon Valley Runners Wiltshire Half Marathon Sunday 24th November 2024

This year's AVR Wiltshire Half Marathon will be taking place on Sunday 24th November at 11am starting and finishing at Station Yard, Edington and passing through Steeple Ashton and Keevil.

Runners will start to arrive from approx. 9.30am and the last runner is expected to cross the finish line at approx. 2pm. The course will be cleared of signage by 4pm. The organisers have informed that the PC that they appreciate that parking is quite limited in the vicinity of Station Yard but will do all they can to ensure that disruption is kept to an absolute minimum.

Signs will also be put out on the course approximately two weeks in advance of the event with details of the event and contact details.

This will be the 12th running of the hugely successful event which helps to raise much-needed funds for the Wiltshire Air Ambulance.

### Inclusion

Seaside places have lots of smells that you don't often get inland. Specifically, if it is a fishing port, the fishy smell might be very strong, and not in a pleasant way.

Jesus started his ministry in the fishing town of Capernaum beside the Sea of Galilee. In a hot climate the smell would have been even stronger, making the harbour a place to avoid. But that is where Jesus went to call his first followers. He didn't go to the temple or synagogue to recruit religious leaders. He didn't go to the Roman fort to recruit strong soldiers. He didn't go to the town centre to recruit rich merchants and businesspeople. They would all follow him in due course.

Instead, Jesus went where other people stayed clear and called the fishermen who worked hard for a day's living. They followed him, and as we read the stories of Jesus in the Bible, we see the great contribution they – Peter, Andrew, James and John - made to his work.

In short, Jesus included the people others might ignore. That sense of inclusion is all the stronger as we begin the Sundays of Trinity. The Trinity embraces God the Father in heaven, God the Son who came to this earth, and God the Holy Spirit binding heaven and earth. It includes everyone who listens to God's call, whether in earth's sweetest or smelliest places.

Our Key Stage 2 children experienced two years of significantly disrupted education owing to two covid lockdowns that closed schools, plus long-term restrictions that were in place across the subsequent two years.

Not only did the children have to deal with the huge social impacts resulting from Covid, but at the start of term, all pupils were behind educationally. The final results underline what a fantastic job our teachers and support staff have done to help them achieve these results, and they fully deserve this special recognition.

In other news, Keevil School's free preschool Forest School began in May. The Children made clay animals, balanced on the timber trail, found fossils and dinosaur bones buried in the soil, and made outdoor music. However, jumping in our muddy puddle seemed to be the most popular activity!

We are hugely grateful to Wickes in Trowbridge for supporting the Forest School through their Community Project funding scheme. They donated many new tools and a new water butt for our pupils and preschool children to use during their Forest School sessions.

The pre-school forest school sessions take place in our wonderful Forest School, located just behind the main School building. Please call the school office to book onto the next available dates: Wednesday 5th June, Wednesday 3rd July 2024. The sessions are completely free of charge, aimed at 3 to 4 year old children and their parents/carers, start at 1.30pm, and run for 90 minutes.





Bryan writes...

To mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day, I have produced this revised version of an article I wrote for the June 2014 issue of the Newsletter. Much of the information has been gleaned from pages 61 to 114, Volume 2 of 'A Book of Keevil' (1998), published by The Keevil Society, with their kind permission.

After dropping the Paratroopers in Normandy during the early hours, the surviving planes – crewed by members of 38 Group made up of airmen from the RAF, RAAF, RNZAF and RCAF – returned to RAF Keevil, and their crews tried to sleep. By the evening of D-Day, the men were climbing once more into their refuelled and reserviced aircraft, and taking off again for France at 19.00 hrs. Towing Airspeed Horsa Gliders loaded with Light Infantry Troops and equipment, and maintaining an altitude of 1,000 ft, the Stirlings headed across the Channel. The first of the gliders to be released by its pilot landed west of the Caen Canal, at 21.30 hrs. It was quickly joined by others. The soldiers' task: to unload and set up six and 17-pounder anti-tank guns, to defend the Pegasus Bridge.

Today, in the villages of Steeple Ashton and Keevil, it is difficult to imagine the extent and impact of the infrastructure and operations which accompanied the new aerodrome here during the Second World War. Most of the original 400 or so buildings and other constructions which formed RAF Keevil have since been demolished. They were built to accommodate and service more than 2,500 permanent staff, with several of the buildings being situated in lanes to the south and east of Steeple Ashton – areas which for years had been utilised only for farming. Before the airfield's construction, Acreshort Lane for instance, was little more than a stony track.

A wartime Location Plan of RAF Keevil shows at least 17 numbered sites, with the airfield itself as "Site No. 1". A large Bomb Stores – "Site No. 2" - is indicated just to the south of the airfield, with numerous other sites depicted across the south of Steeple Ashton and beyond. Accommodation units were situated around the south end of Acreshort Lane, in Southbrook Lane, off Edington Road and off Drove Lane. Some were used to house displaced persons and Polish refugees after the war. A few of these still stand - having been used variously as pig sties, chicken sheds, football changing rooms, and more recently, commercial units. Nissen Huts can be seen today on the east side of Edington Road, just past the village sign. Lengths of wartime concrete track are also still in place at various locations, notably Drove Lane and Whitelawn Lane, in the area off Edington Road which lies beyond the south end of Acreshort Lane. A Nissen Hut which was once the hospital and mortuary still stands off Whitelawn Lane, and a complex of underground air-raid shelters and other brick-built buildings existed near the end of Acreshort Lane until the early 1990s.

One of our late Steeple Ashton residents to have had a good recollection of wartime life in England was lifelong village resident Mary Ashby, who passed away in 2021 aged 91. Miss Ashby was a young teenager during the early 1940s, living with her parents Victor and Winifred in the grocery shop at the entrance to Acreshort Lane. Mary could recall, in the weeks preceding D-Day, seeing Airspeed Horsa Gliders held in the fields on the south side of Hinton Lane. Also, from the time approaching the Normandy invasion, she clearly remembered a manned checkpoint – comprised of some oil drums supporting a barrier rail – being in place in the High Street, next to the Black Barn on the corner of Acreshort Lane. This blocked off the High Street to the south of her parents' shop, along with Acreshort Lane. Mary said how, in cold weather, soldiers manning the barrier would light fires at the base of the wall fronting the Black Barn – so her father Vic soon took to allowing the duty-sentry use of his shop's front porch!



### D-Day, RAF Keevil

At the Keevil airbase, leisure and entertainment was limited due to official restrictions, but both the Officers' Mess and the Sergeants' Mess held the occasional dance or social evening. These would be attended by both village and WAAF girls, plus others from the local towns. The Dance Hall was used as a chicken shed after the war, and now forms part of Brian and Joyce Pearce's caravan site at Raydown Leaze on Edington Road. This old hall is amongst several original wartime buildings on the Pearce's site.

Earlier in the war, while the USAF were based at RAF Keevil, some stars and entertainers apparently visited the base. Intriguingly, it has been claimed by some that Glen Miller and his orchestra, Bing Crosby and Vera Lynn all performed there at different times. Outside of the base, the airmen tended to "swamp the Longs Arms" as one US veteran remembers, adding: "The locals treated us very well indeed." Further afield, the men used the George Hotel in Trowbridge – a fine 16th-century building in Fore Street, the site of an inn since at least 1467 (now a Clarks shoe shop; it was closed and gutted in 1981). Establishments in Devizes, Westbury and Bradfordon-Avon were also frequented.

Opened in the June of 1942, RAF Keevil was used from September to November by the US Army Air Corps (later renamed USAF). They utilised the base as a staging destination for Dakotas en route to North Africa. In 1943 the airfield was occupied by the popular US unit the 153rd Observation Squadron – flying Boston Light Bombers, ex-RAF Spitfires, P51 Mustangs, plus Piper L-4s. Squadron members would often hand out sweets and chocolate to the children of Keevil and Steeple Ashton, and organise parties for them on the base. Some lucky youngsters were even allowed to sit in the cockpit of the Douglas Boston.

In December 1943 the US 363rd Fighter Group arrived, and spent a short time here waiting for P51 Mustangs – which they did not receive until the unit had moved on to Kent in the February of 1944.

The next phase of activity at the airfield began in March 1944, with the arrival of 196 and 299 Squadrons of 38 Group RAF, and Army Pilots of the Glider Pilot Regiment. As mentioned earlier, various British and Commonwealth aircrew flew Stirling Heavy Bombers out of Keevil on the 5th/6th June. They also took part in the Arnhem operation - codenamed Market Garden - in the September of 1944. Heavy losses and casualties of both Army and Air Force personnel were incurred during the operation, and a number of aircraft were lost. In her book 'Our Wiltshire Village' (1989), the late Betty Smith – another of our residents to have had vivid wartime memories - recalls walking through the farmvard of Manor Farm at the end of The Strand with her husband Ivor while he was on leave during September 1944, and being astonished to see the fields "full of wings" - Horsa Gliders ready for Operation Market Garden. "A week later" she writes, "we were gone and so were they." After the operation, she was told how St Mary's Church tower had looked "like Eros in the middle of Piccadilly Circus, with planes and gilders flying around instead of London buses and taxis!"

During this time, 196 and 299 Squadrons also flew Stirlings out of Keevil for various clandestine operations over France. Transporting members of the SAS, SOE and others, they would take off and fly by moonlight, maintaining a low-level altitude towards their secret destinations. It was vital that they reached their location at the predetermined time, as lights and code signals would only be switched on for two minutes by the Resistance waiting below. A successful flight home to Keevil would then be dependent upon the evasion of Luftwaffe nightfighters. One veteran of 299 Squadron recalled, on more than one occasion in 1944, walking into the George in Trowbridge, and being reunited with "SAS and others" whom he had previously dropped in France. Having completed their missions, they had returned to England by reaching the south coast of France or Gibraltar, where torpedo boats from Malta had then picked them up.

From October 1944, RAF Keevil was used as a training base by No 22 Heavy Glider Conversion Unit – flying twin-engined Albemarles coupled with Waco Hadrian Gliders. By June 1945, the airfield was occupied by 61 Operation Training Unit, training newly-qualified pilots to fly Spitfires, and then later, Mustangs.

From its beginning as a fully-operational base in the summer of 1942, Keevil Airfield was used as a site to assemble Supermarine Spitfires. The aircraft were put together in the large Final Assembly Hanger, accessed through the farmyard of Manor Farm at the end of The Strand. The Griffon and Merlin engines were made by Rolls-Royce. Various other parts were manufactured locally in small workshops – such as the Barnes Steamroller works at Southwick – and then sent to the new Vickers factory in Bradley Road, Trowbridge, also built during 1942. Vickers constructed the wings, built and fitted out the fuselages, and installed Merlin engines. From Trowbridge, the fuselages and wings would be sent to Keevil for assembly, where propellers and Griffon engines were also fitted. (The Bradley Road building eventually became owned by engineering company Hattersley Heaton. It was demolished in 1996, and the area is now a retail park).

The new planes were made ready for flight at the Final Assembly Hanger, and then flight tested from the airfield. They would finally leave Keevil to be delivered to RAF squadrons around the country, with many flown out by female pilots. A total of 569 Spitfires were assembled here during the war – all making their maiden flights just a few hundred yards from the centre of Steeple Ashton. Keevil-built Spitfires were used in Europe, the Far East, and the North-African desert – and a handful apparently survived to see combat during post-war hostilities between Israel and Egypt, with both nations' forces flying the aircraft.



When the Second World War finally came to an end, RAF Keevil soon wound down its activities – and July 1947 saw it ceasing to be a fully-staffed base. The 1950s gradually witnessed the airfield becoming a semi-abandoned, partially derelict, and quite desolate area. It was certainly used far less by the military than it is today – and access was virtually unrestricted. As children, my friends and I would use the area as a great adventure playground – riding our bicycles around the perimeter track (and later, motorcycles), roller-skating on the flat roof of the Control Tower, and exploring the many abandoned buildings. I particularly recall the excitement and apprehension of feeling our way through a series of dark, underground bunker rooms, ankle-deep in water (long-since safely sealed off!).

In 1956 and 1957, Keevil was used by RAF Hullavington Training School, for pilot training on jet-powered Provost aircraft. Instructors flew the planes over from their north-Wiltshire base, and the pupils commenced their "circuits and bumps" – at the airfield which just a few years before, had been alive with the sound of Stirlings, Spitfires and the preparation for armed operations in the largest conflict in human history.

During my research for this article, I have read various accounts of extreme acts of bravery, endeavour and endurance carried out by servicemen in wartime operations from RAF Keevil. To choose between these servicemen, and single out one account to reproduce here, would prove almost impossible – and would perhaps do a disservice to the others. Therefore, as a tribute to all those involved at the Keevil airbase during the conflict – including the many anonymous military and civilian men and women who served there – I have decided to finish with a poem. These verses appear, undated and with no author's name, on page 109, Volume 2 of 'A Book of Keevil' (1998). They were written by a post-war flying instructor from RAF Hullavington, apparently reflecting alone at Keevil Airfield whilst his pupils trained in the skies above. ("Long legged" refers to the Stirling's extra-long undercarriage. "Hercules" was the name of the Stirling's engines, and "Pundit" was the homing-beacon for returning aircraft.) **Bryan Berrett**
