STEEPLE ASHTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

St Mary's Playing Field

Firstly, I would like to thank the group of volunteers who have been researching, gaining funding and those who have helped at fundraising events. As we have been actively fundraising, I thought you all might like an update on the progress so far.

Things are moving forward. You may have noticed the main football goals have vanished. These were kindly donated by the Parish Council to Semington Magpies Football Club. We are glad they can be reused for many years to come. Now that they have been removed, we are now going to place a five aside pitch. Thanks to the Melksham Area Board, the group was awarded £950.00 to buy new suitable permanent goals and nets. These we hope will be up ready for the summer holidays.

One item the village voted to have was a Petanque Pitch. This again will hopefully be in situ during the summer. We are currently awaiting materials and volunteers to help put this in place. If you can help, please do contact me.

Thanks to the great success of the charity bingo night held in May which raised after costs \pounds 936.92 the group at the last meeting decided to purchase a couple of cricket nets. Again, these will be in place for the summer holidays.

The group have also manged to secure funding from the Great Western Community Forest Project. The project has already planted hundreds of trees and hedges in Bulkington Community Park and will do the same in St Mary's. There is no cost to the Parish Council and they will be awarded money which will be ring-fenced to maintain the trees/ hedges for the next ten plus years.

Regards main play equipment. The group have met with many suppliers and have narrowed it down to two. This type of equipment is very costly, they will have to do lots more fundraising. So, watch this space!!

Talking of fundraising. Did you know you can sign up for free to Easy Funding? Download the App and search for Steeple Ashton Recreation and Community Development Group. It's free and simple to use. Each time you shop online, the group gets a small parentage of your purchase from the retailer at no cost to you. We are also hoping to hold a dog show in September. Penny Hornsey, who arranged one a few years ago, has approached the group and is willing to help arrange another one. It was a great success last time. We will keep you posted on this.

I do hope you can see that the group is making progress. Sadly, it is not a quick fix and we do need to have a safe area for the children to play. They are our future of the village after all. But hopefully reading this, you will see that it is not only going to be a playing field, but a place for all generations of the community to enjoy.

Please do come along to our meetings, which take place the 2nd Monday of every month in the village hall. If you can spare a few hours to help with the project, such as fund raising, or muscles to help we would love to see you.

Highways Working Group

The Parish Council Highways group have led and provided funding to Wiltshire Council for road safety initiatives in Sandpits Lane , following concerns raised by residents.

We are pleased to advise the work has now been completed which includes much improved pedestrian access into St Mary's playing field from the public right of way in Sandpits Lane. We have achieved this by providing defined steps into the field and the path through the access gate has been levelled and stone chipping added.

A Steeple Ashton village sign has now been erected as you enter the village along Sandpits Lane. 'Pedestrian in the road' signs have been placed either side of the improved access into the playing field. In addition, a painted 'slow' sign has been installed on the road surface.

In providing this village gateway name sign, the additional road signs and painted 'slow' on the road it will emphasise to motorists entering our village that there is potential for pedestrians on the road using the Sandpits right of way into the playing field. We want to see reduced speed and considerate driving through our village and these improvements/additions should have a positive visual impact as you enter via Sandpits Lane.

We will be requesting that Wiltshire Council paint white lines on the road at the new steps to further emphasising a pedestrian access into St Mary's playing field. The Parish Council Highways groups are exploring with Wiltshire Council a second pedestrian access into the playing field from Sandpits lane at a point where there is an existing tarmac pavement and within the 30 mph speed limit.

With the repurposing of St Mary's playing field, it is essential that we consider access improvements to this important village asset.

Appropriately in line with the 80th Anniversary of D-Day, at our June meeting Malcolm Burch gave another very interesting presentation on the links with WW2 and Great Hinton. Based on local memories, it was confirmed that a Pundit Beacon was based in a field by the crossroads, along with some American troops to carry out the operation and maintenance. Malcolm gave the group a description of a Pundit Beacon and outlined the role the Beacons played in WW2. Our Beacon was maintained by some American troops, who lived onsite. At night, the base's Pundit Beacon was employed to flash Keevil airfield's Pundit Code in Morse in red light.

Adverse weather caused us to postpone the village heritage walk part of the meeting, but we hope better conditions will enable us to make it part of the July meeting

We are pleased to announce that the Melksham Area Board has granted the group some funds to purchase presentation and display materials, and we would like to thank Wiltshire Council, and Cllr Jonathon Seed for their support.

#### NATURAL HISTORY CLUB

The very last day of May, eight of our members led by Matt from The Wiltshire Wildlife Trust had an early evening 'tour' of Biss wood which is the home to very rare Bechstein's Bat. Luckily we were preceded by a few days of no rain, a rarity lately, so it was reasonably dry underfoot. I was particularly pleased to see that the good work of the previous owner, Gilbert Green, was still being carried out 12 years later. We saw a lot of Ermine moth caterpillars that envelope trees and hedges with their web. Quite alarming to those who are unaware of this phenomenon. The caterpillars, in their thousands, feed off the foliage and use the webbing as protection against predation. Eventually they turn into small white or light grey moths with small black dots and fly away. The host plants and trees usually recover.

As well as the moths we saw common spotted orchids in the meadow and Balkan Spurge. Cinnamon moth was also seen.

Our summer meeting mid June, which was to be outdoors in Barton House's meadow but due to the weather was again in the church hall, had a member reporting Hedgehogs in his garden captured on film and even a fox eating the hedgehogs food. Luckily not the hedgehogs! A slowworm was found and photographed. Probably a male as no thin black stripe was present down its back. Although some females are without this stripe as well. The same member had Pyramidal Orchids growing in their garden.

We were also shown by one member photographs of Dormice, Bechstein Bats (caught in HARP trap), Great Crested Newts and Butterfly Orchids all taken by his ecologist grandson on a site survey.

We all said that there has been a big increase in Rooks, Jackdaws and carrion crows raiding garden bird feeders this year. What could be the reason? Are we losing their natural habitat locally?

A largish yellow bird, not matching any UK species, was briefly seen in the Gullivers /sandpit lane area. Was it an escapee?

We are a non-subscription village club and free to join so if you want to learn more about the flora and fauna around us, please come along to our next meeting where you will meet local people with knowledge in natural history.

Our next meeting will be on : Thursday at 7:30pm at the Methodist Church Hall, High Street Steeple Ashton. The short talk will be a demonstration of birdsong identification.

#### **METHODIST CHURCH**

#### Mark 6:v.40-43 - The feeding of the 5,000

So they sat down in groups of hundreds and of fifties. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to his disciples to set before the people; and he divided the two fish among them all. And all ate and were filled; and they took up twelve baskets full of broken pieces and of the fish.

In one of their songs, Swedish hymn writer Lina Sandell wrote something that I would translate along the lines of: 'Do the little that you can, and never look upon it, thinking it is too small or unimportant. Because how would you then be able to joyfully walk where your Lord sent you?' These words often come to mind when I think of a tiny amount of bread and fish feeding thousands. There is so much power in the smallest action of love. This should never be underestimated. Climate change and extreme weather conditions are a worry to us all. How do we take care of God's creation so it will still be there for future generations? The feeding of the 5,000 might sound implausible, and so might any good news for our future earth at times; but in a tiny morsel of fish and bread there is a rebellious hope. We need this hope, and so does our world.

Prayer: God of life, give us the imagination and the courage to work for a better future. Help us to see power in the smallest of actions, so that we never give up. Amen

Petertide, the Feast of St. Peter ( and now also St. Paul in Common Worship) this year celebrated on 29th June is the traditional time for the Ordination of Priests and Deacons. My own ordination as a Deacon took place on the Feast of St. Michael (Michaelmas) almost twentyone years ago at Salisbury Cathedral when Bishop David washed my feet and those of my fellow ordinands during the service. That simple act epitomises what it means to be a real Christian and is a re-enactment of Jesus washing the disciples feet at the Last Supper before the Passover Festival ( John 13.1-17). But Jesus was using this act to show that he was no greater than anyone else and that we should be prepared to follow the examples of Jesus as best we can. "I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you." (vs.15). Jesus also said," whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first must be slave of all." (Mark 10.43-44). Service and humility is a fundamental mark of a true Christian and whilst we may not live up to the exacting standards set by our Lord, we can at least do our level best. At a Chrism and Renewal of vows service in Salisbury Cathedral on Maundy Thursday a few years ago, former Bishop Nicholas in his address said in reference to service and humility said that"no matter what it looks like on great church occasions, it is not convincing in our day to proclaim the authority of institution and hierarchy." In reality building the Kingdom of God begins not at the top, but at grass roots level, that is in our case, but not exclusively, "the parish church" here at St. Mary's. There is much to do and success can only be achieved by teamwork. Fortunately St. Mary's has a dedicated team who work extremely hard in our Lord's service. But the whole village and wider parts within the parish boundary have a part to play in supporting that work. At the D Day concert in June St. Mary's the church was full to the brim and someone remarked, "Wouldn't it be nice if it was as full as this on a Sunday!" Wouldn't it indeed!

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
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
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#### STEEPLE ASHTON OIL SCHEME

#### Bryan writes...

#### Louisa Pollard, June 1926 – May 2024

Bryan and Terry Berrett and families would like to thank all those who extended their condolences at the loss of our dear aunt Louisa, who passed away just four weeks short of her 98th birthday.

#### A Tribute

As far as I know, Louisa ('auntie Lou') was the oldest Steeple Ashton resident. She was born on the 22nd June 1926 in Waun-Lwyd, just south of Ebbw Vale, South Wales. She was the fifth of 11 children; tragically, four died during childhood, leaving four brothers and three sisters.

Lou was 12 years younger than her eldest sister (my mother Doreen) and 13 years older than her youngest sibling Mary. Despite the difference in their ages, they had a special bond, and the whole family were very close.

Lou never married. Consequently, she had no children, but she had a large extended family of 17 nieces and nephews, of which I am the eldest. Most of us had children, and our families have grown so much that Lou recently became a great, great, great aunt! Lou's family were very important to her. She was never happier than when she was surrounded by several generations, and if a baby was present, she was over the moon!

When my Welsh cousins were growing up, they loved their visits to her old quirky thatched cottage in Silver Street, with its winding staircase hidden in a cupboard, and large back garden. They also loved her Welsh Cakes, and other meals she cooked in her ageing Rayburn. They have their own memories – too many to share here.

Lou was born just after the General Strike. This was followed in the 1930s by the Great Depression. By 1932, almost half the male population of Wales were out of work – and Lou's father was one of them. She never forgot those days. It taught her to waste nothing – to make-do-and-mend, and recycle – to prepare for hard times, and to strive for a better life. Lou never forgot where she came from; she was still sending money home to her mother in the 1950s.

Before the NHS was formed, when Lou was 15 years old, she was sent to care for me just three days after I was born, as my mother was too ill from the birth to cope. She also cared for my mother and I five years later when we both had pneumonia at the same time, whilst also looking after my baby brother Terry. In 1944 at age 18, Lou registered for war work. She intended to join the NAAFI, but her father persuaded her to join the Red Cross - so she began working at a hospital for wounded soldiers in Newport.

After the war Lou worked in domestic service. She was a housekeeper and cook for a family in Bristol, on Clifton Down.

Later, a prolonged spell of ill health due to a blood disorder forced Lou to leave her job on Clifton Down, and return home to Ebbw Vale. Slowly she recovered, with the help of iron injections, which she continued to use for some years.

In 1947 my parents moved from Bristol, where they had spent the war years, to the family farm in Steeple Ashton. Later, they learned that Mrs and Mr Herbert of Ashton House required a cook and housekeeper. (The Herberts were from the family that owned the now-defunct Alfred Herbert Ltd machine-tool company of Coventry.)

So it was, that in the early 1950s auntie Lou moved to Steeple Ashton. She loved working for the Herberts, living in a cottage attached to the main house, arranging and cooking for dinner parties etc, and travelling with them to stay in their London flat.

After Mr Herbert died, Mrs Herbert moved to a house in Hilperton which she named 'Little Ashton', and Lou moved with her. However, Lou was not happy there. So, in the early 1960s she returned to Steeple Ashton and rented a cottage in Silver Street owned by Mr and Mrs Holmes.

Ever resilient, Lou took a job on a chicken farm. She also did some domestic work and cooking for Mrs Holmes, and for the owners of Old

Merchants' Hall. She served behind the counter in my parents' grocery shop at 48 High Street, cooked for private dinner parties, and worked as a caretaker and cleaner at the village school. Lou became involved in many village activities: WI, Forget-Me-Nots, the Village Hall Entertainments Committee and the Ladies' Club.

Later, she started a part-time catering service for weddings and birthdays. She was eventually joined in this venture by Betty White and her husband Chris, who were among the many good friends she made here over the years. Mary Ashby was an outstanding friend. As they both grew older, Mary phoned her every morning to make sure she was OK.

Brought up in the Methodist tradition, auntie Lou had a strong religious faith, and as a young teenager taught Sunday School classes in Chapel. She was good at needlework, an excellent cook, and a keen gardener. She enjoyed an occasional glass of wine, gin, or brandy, and loved dark chocolate. She read novels, and books about influential women. She loved dogs, but never had one after she left Wales.

In December 2021 Lou suffered a bad fall in her cottage, breaking the top of her arm. After a period in hospital her worsening dementia made it impossible for her to return to Silver Street. Consequently, for the past twoand-a-half years she has been well looked after at Wingfield Care Home, Trowbridge, where she was comfortable and not distressed. She passed away there in the early hours of Saturday 25 May. She was the last link with my parents' generation.

Lou was proud, independent, not afraid to speak her mind, and sometimes stubborn. She was always a pleasure to visit, and unforgettable. To say we will miss her is an understatement. Personally, I will miss that "Hello love"! Bryan Berrett

The event, run by Friends of Keevil School (FOKS), was a fantastic success and raised almost £8,000 for the school. It was made possible by over 75 volunteers who ran the various activities and food stands during the weekend.

This year the village kindly allowed the school use of the rec, which really added to the event, making it possible to host lots of games and activities to entertain the children.

Given the summer so far, we were incredibly lucky to experience fair weather, and this year's scarecrow entries raised the bar once again.

The money raised will help fund new school equipment as well as improvements to our forest school, which now runs free pre-school sessions. Head Teacher Lindsey Hermon said "I'd sincerely like to thank everyone who came along and got involved, all of the volunteers and organisers led by FOKS, and of course the scarecrow makers. However, as always, the biggest thanks goes to Keevil residents for supporting the school in such a huge way and welcoming all of the visitors."

In other news, our year four children experienced their first trip away from parents and carers with an exciting residential school trip to the Brecon Beacons, staying in the Danywenallt Youth Hostel and undertaking activities led by staff from the National Parks Authority.

The activities centred around the wildlife and geography of the National Park. This included a treasure hunt, survival challenges, and a tough 4.5 mile hike, learning navigation skills along the way.

Lindsay Hermon reinforced the importance of these trips, "The children met all of the challenges thrown at them with an incredible spirit. Through taking part in challenging activities the children move outside of their comfort zones, which helps them develop resilience and self-belief. This translates into increased self-esteem and better learning behaviours back in the classroom."
